10 New Pet Waste Stations



We always promote picking up pet waste. It transmits pathogens and parasites, Some of these can survive in soil for many years! It is also high in phosphorus and nitrogen which can pollute water and cause eutrophication harming local ecosystems. We have ordered ten new stations to be placed at parks and trails. The new signs included a QR code to our website where pet parents can calculate the household pet waste per pound. There is 23 million fecal coliform bacteria in each gram of dog poop! It is a common misconception that dog poop is good fertilizer. Grazing animals' diets are plant-based: grain, hay, soy meal, cottonseed, corn silage, and more. Their poop mainly consists of undigested plant fibers. These fibers can add a boost of nutrients to the soil in your garden, helping your plants grow. Dog poop is a much different story. Since dogs have high protein diets their poop is much more acidic. As it breaks down, the nutrients are not compatible with the needs of the plants.

Heartworms, Whipworms, Hookworms, Tapeworms, Parvovirus, Giardia, Salmonella, E. Coli., Nitrogen, Phosphorus, and more!
